Is Lesser Evil a Greater Good? U.S. Elections: Guidance, Comfort, Wisdom



It used to be easier to vote for presidents. Or to choose to vote at all. Believers would look for candidates most aligned with our (hopefully) biblically informed views and vote in good conscience. Yes, we experienced internal conflict about colliding priorities, but we could still satisfy ourselves about whom we supported.

Every election seems the most decisive one ever for the future of the nation, the church, and the world. A sense of “vote-significance” has always been the case and should be; otherwise, democratic elections are façades.

And yet to me, *this* election seems poised to launch larger and longer consequences for the nation than ever before. *This* presidential election seems as existentially confusing as it is historically critical because neither candidate fully aligns with my views and both seem unworthy of my trust. Someone noted this is an Isaiah 1:5 moment: “the whole head is sick; and the whole heart is faint.” The quandary affects my desire to get out and vote.

But I need not wring my hands in fret and doubt. Why? We are not the only ones facing all-important elections this year. Citizens from Austria to Azerbaijan, Benin to Bosnia have already voted. *Brexit* and Colombia’s results surprised and shocked most people. Christians from other nations regularly face the dilemma of the “devil and the deep blue sea.” These fellow believers offer us some guidance, comfort and wisdom.

A Word of Guidance from Other Nations

The lack of trustworthy candidates is a standard feature across the world in every election. It might be somewhat new to Americans, even though historians tell us about “crooks and criminals, conmen and clowns” running for office throughout our short history. Any exceptionalism has never been in the *character* of these very human candidates, but exists only in our constitution, institutions, laws and processes that yield certain outputs

and positive outcomes. Other nations survive, and we will too, regardless of who wins. So American Christian, do not fret!

Christians elsewhere cope straightforwardly with election shenanigans. Always a minority, they express their preferences but do not place their hope in any one person or even one political system. I remember attaining voting age in the world’s largest democracy, with over 1,000 unregistered parties broken off from nationally recognized ones. Election time had a circus feel. Bright, colored trucks with car-battery operated amplifiers carried candidates and their entourages. No one took all these “crooks and criminals, conmen and clowns” seriously except their groupies. I voted—not at all because I thought it was a moral obligation or that it made a major difference. I was merely convinced of the privilege of responsible citizenship, gained by the sacrifice of those before me, and an opportunity not given to many in our world. I voted based on two criteria: personal character (not personality) and potential consequences. So American Christian, do vote!

We can also learn from our brothers and sisters who process their “devil and sea” as part of the biblical framework of spiritual blessing and divine judgment of all peoples. If it wasn’t for the perspective of spiritual blessing, they might persuade themselves that God has absconded from their nations. They are instead convinced that God is loving their nations by calling individuals to repentance, stirring the Church to ministry, and bringing people to Himself—witness the recent history of Ethiopia, and China, and Nepal. They

also believe their nations are experiencing judgment *while* being blessed: The lack of better candidates or options suggests divine judgment. The rapid regress in moral mores and social relations fulfills “last-days” prophecies and denotes divine judgment. Our brothers and sisters guide us theologically: American Christian, do not doubt God’s blessing or judgment!

Despite national brokenness believers find true hope in a robust theology of history—Jesus’ final Kingship, and geography—Jesus’ global Kingdom. The most broken nation in the Western hemisphere, Haiti, and the most broken nation in Western Africa, Liberia, are both democracies. At each election cycle, Haitian and Liberian Christians vote with hope in God and without trust in princes. Their guidance to us? American Christians, do trust! But only in God, in His promises and His purposes.

A Word of Comfort from Scripture

Psalm 11 framed a message of mine to broken Liberia and encloses what I wish to share with a breaking America. Today we live the cry of Psalm 11, verse 3: “If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do?”

The righteous have two options. One is to somehow “fly away” from reality. Christians all over the world understandably share the temptation to withdraw from the pervasive corruption, degeneration and violence in their environments (vs. 1–3). If we take the escape route, however, we make a horrific statement. Our retreat reveals that we lack *radical confidence* in God’s sovereignty. We don’t really believe He rules all (vs. 4a), tests all (vs. 4b-5), and judges all (vs. 6). The psalmist chides this faithlessness: “How can you say to my soul, ‘Flee as a bird to your mountain?’” (vs. 1b).

Whenever the righteous are afraid they find *deep comfort* in God’s sovereign awareness, activity and ability: “For the LORD is in His holy temple; the LORD’s throne is in heaven” (v. 4). God’s good and powerful control of global realities means no leader of any nation gets there without God’s placement. All earthly leaders are temporary—in the U.S., presidents govern 3,000 days at most. Some “democracies” have presidents for 30 years, yet they are all contingent. All leaders will die. All nations eventually cease.

In his conclusion (vs. 7), the psalmist gives the righteous the second option. Since the Lord is righteous, and loves righteousness, he calls us to a *thorough commitment* to doing righteousness. We are to practice what pleases God even as society breaks down like a brittle breakfast bar.

So no Christians in any nation need to run from reality; they need to stabilize their reading of reality with a radical confidence in God’s righteous sovereignty and receive deep comfort in it. Then weakening foundations don’t abate our ongoing commitment to righteous influence and activity in every sphere of human existence.

A Word of Wisdom from Experience

In terms of elections, Christians do not fret, they vote; they do not doubt, they trust. If the character of candidates can’t be trusted to create an environment for engaging in righteousness (vs. 7), can believers move to a practical approach in decision making? Can they intentionally or intuitively analyze the risks of each office

and each candidate and each policy to make practical decisions about their vote?

I recently found this approach over an exquisite dinner in Singapore, a remarkable city-state. Two older leaders of global stature, political experience and Christian conviction brought up U.S. politics.

Their practical advice to us? Vote for whoever will cause the most *reversible damage*.

I like that wisdom because we can apply it while being less than omniscient. Voting for the “least-worst” on the popular “lesser of two evils” principle assumes omniscience because we really don’t know if the lesser evil will turn out to be the greater good. Nor does this wisdom cater to a pragmatism where there is no biblical critique of character.

Here then is a principled voting practice: Mix a strong view of God’s sovereignty with a long view

of human history, and then vote. Vote for whoever will likely cause the most *reversible damage*. This principle does not require omniscient awareness about “lesser evil” or “greater good” outcomes. It does need information, knowledge, wisdom and *action*—action toward reversing what any democratic (or republic) *system* allows periodically: directly (or through elected representatives) overturning what policy or candidate if the elected leader does not keep promises.

Fortunately, this world is the worst environment Christians will endure, as it hastens our marginalization, even possible martyrdom. However, “the upright will see His face” (vs. 7c)—the ultimate, intimate yearning of every


human heart. A personal grasp of this eternal guarantee through the Lord Jesus characterizes Christians past-and-present who practice righteousness during times of crumbling moral, social and economic foundations.

If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do? Believers can continue to do what their godly forerunners did and their global family does: Keep on trusting God’s sovereignty, and keep on doing God’s righteousness in the spirit, name and truth of their Lord Jesus. 🙏

National and Dallas Global Proclamation Academies



Confirmed for 2017 (D.V.)

Prospective for 2017

After dedicating the first part of 2016 to convening the Global Proclamation Congress for Pastoral Trainers, RREACH is rededicating and redoubling efforts to conduct Global Proclamation Academies (GPAs) in 2017. GPAs are our premium training institutes in contrast to mass-market pastors conferences, which we also host in various places.

The Lord willing, a national GPA in Romania will kick off RREACH's 2017 global pastoral training efforts. GPA Romania is scheduled for mid-January 2017, and three additional national GPAs are confirmed for subsequent months—including GPA Senegal (late

March), GPA St. Vincent and the Grenadines (late April), and GPA Ivory Coast (late July).

National GPAs are usually 10-day versions of the 21-day Dallas GPA. They take place in delegates' own countries and languages. They are typically spearheaded by Dallas GPA graduates. From 2011 to 2016, RREACH sponsored 49 national GPAs, training 1,220 pastors from 56 countries.

Now, capitalizing on the momentum from the GProCongress, RREACH has set an ambitious goal of conducting 100 national GPAs between 2017 and 2020. An average of 25 academies each year is a marked increase from the previous goal of 10 per year, which often was exceeded as the Lord provided. It is a major undertaking that will require significant effort and multiple partnerships.

RREACH is in communication with pastoral leaders in 26 additional countries about prospective national GPAs. And, for the first time, in 2017 national GPAs may happen in countries never represented at a Dallas GPA. Because of the GProCongress, pastoral leaders not previously associated with RREACH have heard about national GPAs and want to help coordinate them in their own countries.

Please pray for the Lord to pave the way for 25 national GPAs in 25 countries. Pray that our national GPA execution team would find God's favor while planning these important pastoral training academies.

Dallas GPA

Our Dallas Global Proclamation Academy plans include a strategic reunion of graduates after every five-year cycle (see page 7). After 2016's break from the annual Dallas GPA, the RREACH office is buzzing with planning efforts for the 2017 event.

The three-week Dallas GPA, which has occurred on the campus of Dallas Theological Seminary annually since 2005, is a once-in-a-lifetime pedagogical and networking experience featuring world-renowned master coaches, including presidents and deans of evangelical seminaries.

Each year, the academy brings together 25 of the world's finest, young pastors from 25 different countries—all of whom have a proven passion for training fellow pastors in their regions.

Since its inception, the Dallas GPA has graduated 248 pastors from 80 countries. The 2017 Dallas GPA, the Lord willing, will take place June 4-24 on the campus of Dallas Seminary.

In preparation, RREACH's network of pastoral trainers around the globe has already begun to nominate applicants. RREACH staff is working through applications and Master Coaches are being contacted. Look for ways you can be involved soon!

Begin by praying for the 2017 Dallas GPA. Pray specifically that God would send 25 fine, young pastors and that some would be from countries never before represented at the Dallas GPA. Pray also for excellence in RREACH's planning efforts and for God's provision in every aspect of this important training event. 🙏

Vagabondslave: Resuscitation → Revitalization

In late summer, Dr. Ramesh Richard came back to life after a two-month break from speaking. “With anticipation and after a period of recovery, this Lazarus is stirring, having heard His ‘come-forth.’ I am, I hope, walking out of the soul-tomb and trusting the grave clothes to fall off quickly,” he wrote. Providentially, the valley he experienced following the mountain-top of the GProCongress (and the steep climb to get there) was not as deep as he anticipated.

The RREACH board of directors mandated he recuperate six weeks following the June GProCongress. Some trusted friends had suggested six months of rest, so he scaled back his activity another few weeks. During that “preaching fast”, God used His Word, His Spirit, His children (including Ramesh’s own family), His opportunities and His gift of time to resuscitate His servant.

Time spent in the books of Acts, the Pauline epistles, and Deuteronomy offered inspiration and clarity as many inquired of him, “What’s next?” Shortly before his first speaking engagement in two months, he experienced God’s special assurance. “Whatever you need, I am,” promised the Lord. Not “whatever you need, I have; but whatever you need, I am.” On that morning of awakening Ramesh wrote in his journal, “Because You are, I am, I can and I will.” So the Vagabondslave once again dedicated his personal proclamation gifting and global proclamation calling to promoting His Lord Jesus worldwide.

The decreed six weeks of rest concluded just in time for Dr. Richard to serve as a mentor-at-large for Lausanne’s Young Leaders Gathering 2016 in Indonesia, an assembly of 865 select young Christian leaders from around the world. He was especially glad to be able to fulfill this request because of Lausanne’s strong affirmation of the GProCongress.

Though he wasn’t officially back up to RR-speed, his trip included both a stop in Singapore to thank friends and a few days in Malaysia sponsored by son Ryan’s clients wishing him to speak. He also met with the GProCongress follow-up team there. The next four years of GProCongress-initiated activity (GProCommission for Trainers of Pastors) is critical: “The Congress follow-up is perhaps the most important global undertaking that

is happening for the Church anywhere, and it has great potential as we near the end of this stage of salvation history,” he says.

To his joy, Ramesh’s trip coincided with the graduation and 25th anniversary celebration of Jordan Evangelical Theological Seminary, founded by long-time friend Dr. Imad Shehadeh. Dr. Shehadeh had also served at the GProCongress as the host of the memorable global Communion service.

After that trip, Dr. Richard headed to east Texas for the annual Dallas Seminary faculty retreat, another looked-forward-to event on his schedule. DTS leaders who attended the GProCongress spoke of discerning the school’s future role in theological education in light of what—and who—they encountered in Thailand. “Your point that even if our seminaries spun up to maximum capacity, we would still be impacting a mere one percent

of the world’s pastors has burdened me. It literally rocked my world,” one said. Another admitted, “I was greatly disturbed at Bangkok. Yet that has served to motivate me for ministry ahead.” They and other global leaders in formal training are continuing the discussion stimulated by the Congress.

About 200 RREACH friends gathered in Dallas in early September to praise God for accomplishing

His purposes through the GProCongress and to pray for the nations. Ramesh said this dedicated time of thanksgiving was one of the most meaningful moments to him in RREACH’s 30-year history.

A continued delay in obtaining replacements for official documents stolen earlier this year forced Dr. Richard to cancel part of an upcoming international ministry trip and has left other engagements up in the air. Yet he moves forward with renewed energy and confidence because of I AM, the Lord who goes with him and before him in his personal proclamation gifting and global proclamation calling. 🙏

GPA Cohort Reunions: Another Amazing GProCongress Outcome!



From the inception of the Global Proclamation Academy (GPA), Dr. Richard has been acutely aware that pastors become healthier when they grow in community. Therefore, RREACH intentionally invites Dallas GPA and national GPA cohorts into community-sustaining opportunities. Some of these take place in Dallas and others in the countries where national GPAs are hosted. Other community-building opportunities happen virtually, through video chats, email and social media—months and even years after graduation. In 2010, RREACH hosted 99 Dallas GPA graduates from 52 countries, 63 of whom brought their wives, in Dallas for a special reunion.

The mid-decade GProCongress provided another opportunity for strategic reconnecting. All 138 Dallas GPA and national GPA graduates present (many who came with denominational and agency obligations, as well) were eager to reconnect in

person. Thoughtful planning went into helping them spend time together in Bangkok. Here are a few examples of the community-sustaining opportunities offered to them:

- RREACH set up an area in the main auditorium that intentionally resembled a family living room, complete with comfortable couches and a dining room table. The location quickly became “meeting-central” for graduates looking to reconnect. An on-site picture booth helped them add to their memory databank.
- On Friday, June 17, GPA Chaplain Bill McClure and his wife, Kathleen, arranged for Dallas GPA graduates to gather for lunch in their cohorts. While the sea of 2,500 other Congress attendees made this no small undertaking, the Thai host staff helped set aside a table each for all 10 classes of Dallas GPA pastors from 2005 – 2015. Flashing cell phones helped capture the special moments. Even a few Dallas GPA Master Coaches—Dr. Bill Lawrence, Dr. Mark Yarbrough, Dr. Bruce Fong (all connected to Dallas Seminary), Dr. Rick Reed (Heritage Seminary in Canada) and Dr. Dennis Hollinger (Gordon Conwell Seminary)—came to greet their former GPA students.
- The community-sustaining highlight occurred on Sunday, June 19, when all Dallas and national GPA graduates attended a special reunion. A full Thai buffet complemented the occasion. Dr. Ramesh Richard and his wife, Bonnie, greeted all and Dr. Richard introduced the RREACH Board and other special friends in attendance. The afternoon was completed with introductions and greetings among cohorts.

Perhaps Psalm 133:1 summarizes it best: *“Look! How good and how pleasant it is when brothers dwell together!”*
